

## SEE OUR PEACH PACKING DEMO AT PEACH FEST

Don't miss the Palisade Historical Society's peach packing demonstrations **starting at 10:45 on Saturday, August 19** at Peach Fest in Riverbend Park! We'll show you how Palisade peaches were commercially packed 60 years ago!

Our display and demonstrations will be in the Chef booth close to the entrance. Experienced peach packers will demonstrate wrap-packing, and then invite others to try their hand at this historically important job.

In the first half of the 20th century, packing peaches was a very demanding job during harvest. The Palisade-invented Edwards Grader eased the challenge of selecting similar-sized peaches to maximize the number of peaches to fit in alternating rows. It was important to ensure fruit wouldn't shift or bruise during the long shipments via refrigerated railroad cars.

Also look for our entries in the 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning parade including our 1951 Chevrolet Hoopie where we'll be handing out peaches from local growers along the route.

## GETTING THE RIGHT INFORMATION ABOUT THE ROLLER DAM

In our never-ending effort to ensure we are providing historically correct information, we make extra efforts to debunk the popular—but incorrect—story about the rollers in the Grand River Diversion Dam in DeBeque Canyon. Our research of Reclamation Service records for the 100th birthday of what locals call the "Roller Dam" revealed the metal rollers were not on a German ship sunk by the British as part of the embargo leading to World War I. Though the unique design is by a German firm and other parts of the Dam were manufactured in Germany and shipped to the site, the only set of the seven round metal rollers was made in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

Most recently, we met with Jude Splinter, one of the 25 Amtrak narrators—and self-described "history buff"—who came across a newspaper article with the untrue story and began her research. She also reviewed the U.S. Reclamation Service records to find correct information. Jude contacted us and we showed her the collection of photos and information created for the Roller Dam's 100th birthday party in June 2015.

We appreciate Jude's interest in local history, attention to detail, and perseverance to find the truth!

## STUB DITCH PUMP STILL ON THE JOB

Since 1919, this machine efficiently uses gravity and water from the lower-level Government Highline Canal to pump irrigation water—without any engine, fuel, or electricity—into the higher elevation Stub Ditch which serves users, including orchards and vineyards north of Palisade and west to 30 Road.

The Grand Valley Water Users Association, which operates the Grand River Diversion Dam and Government Highline Canal, recently updated buildings and made improvements at the



Stub Ditch pumping plant. The pump, however, works the same as it did when it was installed in 1919.
