☐ **View the Dam Documentary — Thursday, Aug. 14 from 5 pm to 7 pm at Canyon View Church**

The countdown to the 100th birthday of the Grand River Diversion Dam in DeBeque Canyon officially begins with the premiere of the documentary created by Larry Seibert (InFilms & Design, Inc.) and his longtime associate, video photographer and editor, Scot Stewart.


The documentary will be shown continuously from **5 p.m -7 p.m. on Thursday, August 14 at Canyon View Church** in the Purcell Building at **Third and Main Streets** in downtown Palisade before the 46th Annual Peach Fest's Ice Cream Social begins at the Plaza across Main Street.

Stop by to view the documentary and see the newly created "mobile museum" exhibit containing never-before-seen photos and information detailing the construction of the Diversion Dam, known locally as the "Roller Dam" The official Congressional Dedication of the Dam was June 29, 1915, and this event is the first event of the Historical Society's planned 100th birthday celebration.

The documentary and "mobile museum" exhibit explaining why the Roller Dam makes life in the Grand Valley possible, will be on display at the Palisade History Center, 311 South Main Street, for the next year. During Peach Fest, the History Center will be open Friday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., during Saturday's parade, and for the Sunday Farmer's Market from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Work Continues on *The Palisade Tribune* Archives

In July, Historical Society members Susan and Lee Cesario made a trip to Palisade to help with the Tribune Archive project headed by Syble Seckinger and Nancy Morrison. This project has special interest for Susan as her father, Bill Lorenzen, was the publisher of the *Tribune* from the 1950s until July 1979.

Susan, her mother and three brothers, also worked long hours to get the newspaper out. During that time, hot lead was used to set the lines of type, and then were melted down each week. The headlines were set letter by letter until the offset process began in the seventies. Susan's brothers had responsibility for the tearing down process that was referred to as "hot lead and ink." *The Palisade Tribune* was one of the last papers to employ the linotype method.

We received more donations for the Tribune Archive Fund to purchase archival storage boxes for *The Palisade Tribune* and begin digitizing past issues.

Identification for “Colorado Peaches” Historic Documentary

Earlier this year, the Palisade Historical Society assisted the Sunrise Rotary Club with the promotional documentary produced in the early 1950s by the Rio Grande Railroad and Peach Board of Control. Now linked on the Rotary Club's website: <http://www.palisadecorotary.org/sunrise/peaches/>, the video received a lot of attention. Our newsletter article also inspired Ari Armstrong to contact his uncle, Bill Everheart, who provided some details about the video.

- Specifically, at 1:06, on the right is the Palisade Coal Mine where Bill's father-in-law and Ari's grandfather, Theo Eversol, mined.
- At 1:14 Bill identified stiltwalkers including Lindy Granat as the tallest on the right; at 1:17 is Bob Ames in the red shirt; and at 1:36, is Carl "Mutt" Hampton.
- From 3:50 to 4:10 is Theo Eversol. Eli Murray is at 4:32 with Theo's tractor and appears again at 4:48.
- At 7:59 is of course, the "Roller Dam" in DeBeque Canyon which diverts water to the High Line, Price and Stub canals as well as two Orchard Mesa canals thru a siphon and the power canal thru Vineland to the pumping plant at base of East Orchard Mesa. He added Theo and Eli stood watch at night on the Dam at times, especially during World War II.
- At 8:41 is Ray Dennison; and at 14:43, the woman sorting peaches on the right is Erna Eversol-Aspinall, Theo's sister.
- Both Ari and Bill identified Ford automobiles from 1951 to 1953 to help date the video.

Archie and John Carver grew up at the Roller Dam, as their father, Earl, was Caretaker at the dam from 1926 until 1959. They attended school in Cameo through the 10th Grade and finished at Palisade High School in 1935. Archie (2nd row, 2nd from the left) was about a year and a half older than John (3rd row, 3rd from the left). Because of the way their birthdays fell in the calendar year, Archie was a grade level ahead of John until at some point during their schooling in Cameo, John skipped a grade so the two brothers graduated from PHS together in the class of 1935.

Palisade Historical Society Loses Another Resource

We are saddened by the recent passing of another resource for interesting Palisade history. Virginia Gardner Dodd Flager passed away June 30, 2014. She was born November 7, 1926 in Arkansas and adopted by Japp and Stella Dodd when she was nine months old.

After learning to successfully drive an orchard hoopie, as shown in the photo above, Virginia was a businesswoman in Grand Junction. She worked as the general office credit manager for Gay Johnson's, successfully operated a pallet factory, and later, the Check Rite Collection Agency.

Virginia's memory was always excellent, and she provided the Historical Society information about the Kuner Empson canning factory which closed in the 1950s. Virginia also helped us with locations of downtown Palisade business. She even told us about learning to run the projector at the Elberta Theater from operator Merle Boardman.

For the past two years, Virginia has been a wonderful resource to verify information about Palisade's history. We will miss her, and the chance to hear more of her Palisade memories. Our thoughts and prayers go out to her brother, Jasper, and to her niece and nephews.
