For extreme restorations a larger donation would be appreciated.

Palisade Tribune Newspapers Now on Colorado Historic Newspaper Website!

One of our most important on-going projects is preserving archival copies of The Palisade Tribune and making them available on-line.

We are thrilled to announce 148 issues--from 1949 to 1955--are now available on the Colorado Historic Newspaper Collection (CHNC) website:

This is a wonderful resource of Palisade history! You can search by name or subject, or browse entire pages for articles of interest. The Palisade Tribune is just the fourth Mesa County newspaper digitally available on the CHNC site which has 750,000 pages from 200 newspapers in the State.

In addition to Palisade news, these Tribunes feature columns from nearby communities, including Mt. Lincoln, Rapid



Creek, Cameo, and East Orchard Mesa, as well as Clifton, Fruitvale, Plateau Valley, Collbran, and Mesa.

The funding for this digitization project is made possible by our generous donors, as well as a grant from the Colorado Historic Records Advisory Board (CHRAB) whose funding is from the National Historical Publications and Records Commission (NHPRC), National Archives Records Administration.

The Palisade Historical Society will continue fundraising and applying for grants to get more issues digitized. As part of the CHRAB grant, three more reels of microfilmed Tribunes are currently being processed and may be on the site as early as September.

Gray Gourmet Lunch Bunch Enjoyed Fruit Labels & Displays

The Palisade Historical Society was invited to present the program for the April 26th Gray Gourmet Lunch at the Community Center in Palisade. Charlene Weidner talked about the history of Palisade Fruit Marketing Cooperatives, including the Grand Junction Fruit Growers and United Fruit Growers. She also traced the interesting story of the Mountain Lion brand from the early Midland Railroad symbol and how Palisade peaches were promoted in Denver in 1908 and a peach was added to the Mountain Lion's mouth.

Changes in Palisade Walking Tour Brochure

Since the Historic Walking Tour brochure was updated last year, thanks in part to the Palisade Lions Club donation, there have been a few changes, and more on the way.



Site #5 — 357 Bar and Grill

357 Grill is the new restaurant in the Purcell Building at 235 South Main Street. In 1905, the Palisades National Bank began operating here. From 1916 to 1966, it was the Post Office. Since then, it has been home to a number of restaurants, including the previous one, the Red Rose Cafe.



Site #32 — Lavender Lady Boutique

The Lavender Lady Boutique is now in the Palisades National Bank space once home to Wooden Posts and Billiards Store. From 1953 until the 1970s, it was the offices of physician Dr. Chester Bliss. Lavender Lady moved from the space just south, which is now the offices

of **Longpoint Digital Computer** at site #33. Before that, it was the Chamber of Commerce, and in the 1940s, it was the popular Gene Cutter's Shoe Store.

Ravenesbeque is 3 1/2 Miles West of DeBeque

Two people asked us about the reference to “Ravenesbeak” near Palisade from the book, “Doc Shores: Memoirs of a Lawman.” Charlene Weidner used her extensive research skills and found the answer. Ravensbeque, the correct name, is a small town located some 3½ miles west of DeBeque. It is a little-known town founded by W.A.E. deBeque, who later founded the town of DeBeque. Ravensbeque had a Post Office for a few years in the mid 1880s when the story in the book was written.
