MORE WRAP-PACKING PEACH DEMONSTRATIONS AT CROSS ORCHARDS – May 5th



Following our success at Cross Orchards' event last fall and last week's Day in the Orchard, the Palisade Historical Society will participate in "Spring Day on the Farm" on May 5th Our featured activities include wrap-packing demonstrations where we show how fruit was packed for shipping 60 years ago and other packing shed operations.

As Palisade's fresh peach season will not have begun, experienced packers will make do by individually wrapping peach-shaped squeeze balls in paper and placing them in alternating rows in authentic wooden boxes. Everyone interested in trying their hand at packing will receive a nickel—which is what most seasonal peach packers were paid for professionally fitting 16 pounds of fruit in an entire box in the 1950s and 1960s!



CHATFIELD ELEMENTARY TEACHERS USE HISTORIC PALISADE COLORING BOOKS





CONSTRUCTING THE PRICE DAM IN 1910



The Marie Tipping Archives at the Museum of Western Colorado recently shared photos of the construction of the Price Dam. It was built in 1910 at the mouth of DeBeque Canyon across from Rapid Creek and is still visible as you look at the River near I-70 exit 44. The dam diverted water for the Price and Stub ditch pumping plants until 1917.
