"Railroad History of Palisade" 7:00 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 25

For the next Palisade Reflections program, Matt Darling, a dedicated railroad buff, will present an interesting program about the vital role the Railroads played in Palisade's history. It will be held at the Community Center, 8th and Main Streets beginning at 7 p.m.

Matt is a fourth generation railfan. He began building scale model trains at age six and studied railroad history most of his life. Born in Lafayette, Colorado, Matt has lived in Grand Junction since 1981. He holds a Bachelor's Degree in U. S. History from Mesa State College and is a 10+ year member of the Rio Grande Modeling and Historical Society. As an avid hiker, he has explored several abandoned and active railroad grades of Colorado and Utah. He also volunteers at the Loyd Files Research Library. This is free and open to the public. "Palisade's Riverbend Park." The second class is at 2 p.m. on Wednesday, March 22. Priscilla Walker will present a new program with historic photos and information about the CCC Camp which later housed German Prisoners of War, and the Migrant Labor Camp located two miles west.

The "Town Center" Guided Walking Tour is the third class, starting at 2 p.m. on Thursday, April 6. Charlene Weidner will guide participants along a seven block stroll in Palisade's downtown looking at historic buildings and learning stories about the businesses, homes and people in Palisade history along the route.

Historical Society Provides Photos and Information for New Sign at Island Acres


There's a new sign with local history and photos at the James M. Robb Colorado River State Park, also known as Island Acres, off I-70 Exit 47 east of Palisade. We were pleased to be able to provide information about our vital irrigation systems and photos of the Grand River Diversion Dam, and other interesting local Colorado River history.

The sign was placed in a key location earlier in the fall. It is the first sign you see after you pass the welcoming booth and turn left on Cobblestone Trail towards the picnic areas. 1940s photo of Edwards Grader in action



Thanks to Ida McKay Shrum for sharing this "peach eye view" photo of a unique Palisade invention, the Edwards Grader. It was the brainstorm of

enterprising Palisade residents Billy Edwards and his financial partner, Raymond Peeples.

These machines processed millions of fuzzy Elberta peaches which were harvested from the orchards. Sorters—the two women standing on the side of the grader—picked out fruit that was blemished or too ripe for shipping. Then the horsehair brushes of the mechanical "defuzzer" gently removed the peach fuzz. The brushed fruit was graded according to size as it moved down the spinning, gradually widening rollers in the foreground. The largest peaches rolled to the end before dropping onto a conveyor belt. Similar sized peaches were directed from the belt into a bin where peach packers could quickly fill the boxes with individually paper-wrapped fruit.

In the first half of the 20th century, Elberta was the primary variety of peaches in Palisade. That meant peach harvest was just three weeks—usually in late August and early September. Peaches had to be picked, packed, and shipped in a very short time to arrive at stores - primarily in the Mid-west - in optimum condition. The Edwards Grader made this labor-intensive process easier.
