THE CARSTENS PASSED AWAY

Long time Palisade resident Mary "Dawn" Carstens died in February and husband, James Carstens. just died in November. Dawn did the work to have their house, built by Herbert Crissey at 218 West First Street in 1907, listed on the State Register of Historic Properties on December 11, 2002 and the National Register of Historic Places the following May.

Previous owners of the historic house include Fred and Daisy McKay Bower. Fred was a son of Palisade founder Colonel Christopher Columbus Bower.


The Carstens purchased the home from Fred Larimore in 1971. After some renovation, the Carstens with daughters Staci and Kris, moved into it in 1972 and have lived there since. The house will be for sale in 2021. It is Stop #10 in our Guided Walking Tour Brochure.

CROSS ORCHARDS IS OPEN IN DECEMBER - BUT NO INDOOR TRAIN DISPLAYS

Other events which the pandemic has affected include Cross Orchards and Grand Valley Model Railroad Club's Christmas Train Show. The GVMRC has presented their Christmas Train Show during weekends in December for 31 years.

Cross Orchards will maintain regular hours Thursday-Saturday from 9-3 and on Saturdays it will offer the popular ride-on train.

The Model Railroad Club will have their outdoor G Scale layout operating, though NO INDOOR displays will be open. A new fire pit is ready for people to warm up around. December 19th will be the last day of the season for Cross Orchards until it opens again on May 1st.



MT. LINCOLN SCHOOL-THEN AND NOW

The Mt. Lincoln School at the corner of G Road and 36.1 Road was built in 1901. In 1911, when there were 167 students – including 40 in high school – a two-story school was built just to the east. Palisade's Wayne Aspinall, who served in the U.S. Congress from 1949 to 1973 graduated in 1914 from Mt. Lincoln. He was later a teacher at the school and served on the Mt. Lincoln School District Board before becoming an elected official.

The former single-story school became a popular community center for several years and later a private residence. It is now being restored as Charlie and Brielle Johnson's home.

Charlie explained they have already hauled away 320 square feet of debris – 87 tons – from the site. Also dismantled was a Grand Kiva with a 15' deep pit which had been permitted on the property by a previous owner.

Charlie's grandparents, Charles and Virginia Johnson still live in the Grand Valley.

LOADING FRUIT AT 2nd STREET AND KLUGE AVENUE IN 1922



Michael Pickett found us on Facebook and sent this photo from his F.E. Bunte/Pickett Family collection. It shows trucks loaded with baskets of fruit at the railroad shipping platforms near Kluge Ave. and 2nd Street. The Western Slope Fruit Growers Association sign is on the building on the left and the former depot – now Peach Street Distillers – is on the right. These buildings became the United Fruit Growers' Association after it was founded in 1923.
