

HISTORY OF FRUIT AND WINE IN PALISADE – FEB. 15TH AT NOON

Founding Palisade Historical Society Board Member Harry Talbott will present an interesting program about Palisade's Fruit and Wine history for this month's Mesa County Historical Society's Oral History program. It will be **Thursday**, **February 15**th at noon in the Whitman Educational Center at the Museums of Western Colorado 248 South Fourth Street in Grand Junction.

Palisade has been growing the best tasting peaches for over 130 years, and is also the center of the

newer Colorado Wine Country which includes grape growers and wineries. Harry will tell the story of how Palisade got to be famous for its fruit and is home to 25 of the state's more than 140 wineries.

SEE HISTORIC DISPLAYS AT BASE CAMP RV PARK

The RV Park on North River Road east of Palisade has been open for reservations and is gearing up for a busy camping season. The formal opening is planned for later this spring. In the meantime, Charlene Weidner created an interesting display at the Camp's store. There are several photos of our agriculture and coal mining history as well as a pair of stilts and a picking sack with its 1900 patent.

The Camp's location—about a half a mile east of Palisade—puts the Camp in the center of Palisade's mining past. Visible from the north side of the camp are "Devil's Slide" and the Stagecoach trail which were both created to reach the upper workings of the Mt. Lincoln Coal Mine. The load out near the

railroad tracks across from the RV Camp was later used by the Hickman family to load boxes of Sunset Brand peaches into refrigerated railcars.

You can also see mine workings of the Stokes Mine to the east near Rapid Creek. Across the River to the south was the Midwest Mine which had a trestle across the River to reach the railroad tracks across North River Road from Base Camp RV Park.

In addition to photos, videos, and artifacts to view, our publications are available in the Base Camp store for a donation. The Historical Society may also offer guided tours for campers.

MEMORIAL FOR WESLEY ROSETTE

A marker located about 100 feet from the Colorado-Utah border on Eastbound I-70 is a memorial for Wesley Rosette, the second trooper in Colorado's history to lose their life in the line of duty.

A 31-year resident of Palisade. Rosette killed near Price, UT in a collision with two trucks. He was traveling with Grand Junction Sheriff E. E. Redmon on the way to pick up a prisoner. Rosette was unfortunately killed instantly from the January 31. 1951 collision. Sheriff Redmon



survived with injuries. (continued)

Wesley Rosette joined the Colorado State Patrol on July 18, 1936, a year after it was founded. He was a beloved member of our community who frequently gave safety talks to groups of adults and at schools

Other members of law enforcement with ties to Palisade who have passed away in the line of duty include Ed Innes. He was working as a jailor in Grand Junction and died September 27, 1906 from injuries inflicted by an escaping prisoner.

Government Highline Canal Tunnel #3 collapsed March 8, 1950

The ominous March 10, 1950 headline of *The Palisade Tribune:*

Grand Valley Tunnel 3 Out, 38,000 Acres Dry

A 450 foot section of the 1.75 mile long tunnel collapsed. Workers feverishly drilled from the four exposed ends of the tunnel to finish ahead of schedule. Initial expectations were repairs would not be completed until July. Water began flowing May 4 to the five canals supplied by the Government Highline Canal in time to save the fruit orchards.


