# 1,827 ISSUES OF THE PALISADE TRIBUNE NOW ON THE COLORADO HISTORIC NEWSPAPER WEBSITE!

Thanks to generous donors, 120 more issues from *The Palisade Tribune* are now digitized and available on the Colorado Historic Newspaper Collection website!



This makes 1,827 issues in their database! From the very first issue, June 6, 1903 to December 30, 1966, you can browse, or search for specific names or information. The latest additions include issues from 1931 to 1936. An additional 200 issues of the newspaper–from 1936 to 1942–are in the digitization process and expected to be on the site later this summer.

Select Palisade Tribune to bring up the collection. The CHNC database now has more than 1.1 million pages from 220 Colorado newspapers!

The Colorado Historic Records Advisory Board (CHRAB) gave us initial grants for archival storage boxes and the first issues added to the data base in May 2016. These additional issues are the result of generous individual donors and the support of the Colorado State Virtual Library. ## WCCC ADULT SUMMER CAMP- Saturdays-August 4 & 11

The first session includes multi-media presentations, inventions, and an interactive peach wrap-packing demonstration. The field trip session is a guided tour to see how fruit is processed now, and to visit the first winery that opened in Palisade in 1978, among other interesting agricultural historic sites. ## BILL ELLICOTT PASSES AWAY JUNE 24th

We were sorry to learn that Bill Ellicott, historian and long-time member, resource, and supporter of the

Palisade Historical Society passed away on June 24<sup>th</sup>. He was 94. Bill worked for the D&RGW Railroad for 39 years and was a railroad historian, and had historic photos of Clifton, where he lived since 1955. His collection of padlocks

and keys was truly unique. Bill shared a number of photos, Bookcliffs coal mining maps, and other information with the Palisade Historical Society. We are grateful for his support and invaluable perspective. Bill also volunteered for the Museums of the West at the Cross Orchards site for more than 30 years. He was instrumental in building the Uintah RR display.

#### **APPLES IN PALISADE**

Susan Steinbach contacted us in researching information about apples grown in the Valley for her June 21 Mesa County Historical Society program on "Johnny Appleseed." We gave her information about Palisade's early experiments in growing apples. Though Fruita claims to be where the fruit trees were planted, we credit John Harlow, whose orchards were on Rapid Creek just east of Palisade, as the first settler in the upper valley. He diverted water from Rapid Creek in 1882 and planted different crops, including apples, to see what would grow. Fruita had more apples and fewer peaches because west of Mount Garfield, peaches are more subject to spring frosts.

George W. Bowman, who bought property in Palisade in 1893, won a silver medal from the 1904 Universal Exposition in St. Louis for his apple exhibit. His trees came from William Cutter & Son's Glenwood Nursery in Junction City, Kansas. Unlike "Johnny Appleseed," who planted apple seeds from New York to Indiana in the early part of the 19th century, the Cutter family knew how to bud and graft trees. They brought scions (sprouts or

shoots) of many trees when they moved from New Jersey to Illinois in 1835 and propagated new varieties of apple and peach trees as well as shade and ornamental plantings.

William's father, Samuel Cutter, Sr. and William's three brothers were experts at working with trees. William established a nursery in Illinois and later in Junction City, Kansas. William's older brother, Andrew, developed "Cutter's Long Stem" apple, and a peach called "Stump of the World."

In Junction City, the Glenwood Nursey was a local authority on tree plantings. William propagated the 'Woodbridge' apple—named for their New Jersey hometown—from a seedling. He later moved to Palisade where his sons, Charles and John, and daughter, Nancy Cutter Bowman and son-in-law, George Bowman, had established peach orchards. William passed away in 1910 in Palisade.

Our mild winter climate is conducive to growing unfortunately, peaches, makes susceptible to codling moth disease. In 1923, the Department of Agriculture ordered all apple trees in Grand Valley removed because uncontrollable codling moth infestations, which was devastating to growers in Fruita and Cross Orchards where apples were the dominant crop. Palisade's ability to successfully grow peaches continues to make it the Peach Capital of Colorado for more than 125 years.
