### GUIDED WALKING TOUR – Riverbend Park March 19

#### Charlene Weidner - 10 a.m. at the Park

Our tours for the Town of Palisade Recreation Department continue with the warmer weather. The first tour–**Monday, March 19th**–is **Charlene Weidner's** Riverbend Park tour. It starts at 10:00 a.m. at the Pavilion at the Park Wear comfortable shoes and be prepared to walk about three miles.

Charlene will show the site of the former Civilian Conservation Corp. Camp, built in 1935 to house young men who worked on local irrigation and road projects. Later, German Prisoners of War lived at the CCC Camp in 1944 and 1945. Riverbend Park, located south of Palisade, is now the location of Palisade's many festivals, a boat ramp, walking trails and a disc golf course. Further west, Charlene will show you where the 200 cabin Migrant Labor Camp was located. It housed migrant laborers and their families for peach harvests from 1941 to 1961 when it was closed.

## Wed. April 4<sup>th</sup> – 10 a.m. "Col. Bower"

The second guided walking tour is Wednesday, April 4th. Colonel Bower is portrayed by our own thespian, **Dave Cecuga** for "An Hour with Colonel Bower" tour of Third Street in downtown Palisade. "Colonel" Christopher Columbus Bower was a pioneer of Palisade. He brought his family here in

1894 and set some of the first fruit trees in what is now known as the Vineland east of Palisade. Dave's tour will start at 10:00 a.m. at the Kiosk across from the Post Office. He explains the history of many of the buildings and people who are important to Palisade's history, including the site of Col. Bower's blacksmith shop and home.
