THE TOWN OF PALISADE DONATES \$15,000 TO THE HISTORY MUSEUM

The Town of Palisade fulfilled its \$15,000 pledge to the Historical Society to help renovate the former log building at 3740 G Road into a Palisade History Museum. If fundraising and construction continue at the current pace, the Museum should be open later this spring. 2,650 ISSUES OF THE PALISADE TRIBUNE NOW DIGITIZED AND ON THE CHNC DATABASE

The April 22, and May 20, 1960 issues of *The Palisade Tribune* are now available on the CHNC making a total of 2,650 issues from the 111 years of newspaper archives. These are the only two issues from 1960 in the Historical Society's collection. Unfortunately, all the issues from that entire year were missing when we were allowed access to the Tribune building in the summer of 2014 after the paper ceased publishing. These issues were later donated by families, including Ramona Clinton, who found them and shared with us for digitizing.

The May 20, 1960 issue lead story is especially interesting because it highlights the School Board officially renaming Palisade Elementary after A.E. Taylor. Avon Taylor retired that month after 56 years *(continued)* of being an educator, initially with the Mt. Lincoln School District. For the last 60 years, the school has been called Taylor Elementary. SHIRLEY ROWLEY MAURER PASSED AWAY

We are sad to learn of the passing of Shirley Rowley Maurer at age 90 on December 29, 2019 in Washington. A celebration of her life will be held at the Palisade Cemetery at 11:00 a.m. on May 9, 2020.

Shirley grew up in Palisade, graduating as the valedictorian of Palisade High School in 1947. She returned to Palisade in the 1990s after a career as an educator and raising her four children. Shirley was involved in the community, including serving as the volunteer coordinator at the Chamber of Commerce. *(continued)*

Shirley was also very supportive of the Historical Society in its early years. She, and her husband, Ed Maurer, provided the very first oral and video histories for our collection in 2010! You can read the summaries on our website. Her grandfather owned the Palisade Coal Mine and Shirley was the source of some of our favorite photos.


