#### CREATING AND RENEWING MEMORIES AT CROSS ORCHARDS

We were invited to participate in Fall Day on the Farm at Cross Orchards in October. Our display took visitors back in time to when Palisade peaches were individually wrapped in paper and placed in alternating rows inside wooden boxes for shipping. Using equipment donated to Cross Orchards years ago from the Bowman family's packing shed in Palisade, visitors, especially youngsters, enjoyed the chance to earn a nickel by packing foam squeezeball "peaches." Five cents is what most packers got for packing a whole box 60 years ago! Adults who tried packing quickly learned how hard and exacting the job was. As thousands of workers across the Grand Valley were needed for harvestespecially teenagers-some older visitors shared their memories. One person-who packed Palisade

peaches before the 1950s–remembered the going rate for packers was only two and one-half cents a box. Experienced packers demonstrating the technique at Cross Orchards included Jane McFarland and Dina Fitzpatrick.

#### More than just packing peaches

In addition to wrap-packing peaches, Palisade Historical Society volunteers Ralph Branch and Dave Cecuga demonstrated how George W. Bowman's patented picking sack works. Other packing shed activities included how lids were nailed on the peach boxes using a nail stripper to evenly sort the nails for faster nailing.

## ANOTHER BLOW TO PALISADE RETAIL

The Palisade Historical Society is saddened to learn Portell Computers—which has been housed in the former Presbyterian Church/Masonic Temple—lost their conditional use permit. The retail store at 5<sup>th</sup> Street and Kluge Avenue was closed in October.



Portell Computers has been located in the former Presbyterian Church/Masonic Lodge since 2015.

The Presbyterian Church was organized in Palisade on October 11, 1908 with 33 members. Services were held in Hugus Hall until February 1912 when this building was finished. The church dissolved April 12, 1951, and the building was home to the Palisade Masonic Lodge until 2012. The nearby Palisade First Baptist Church purchased the property, and Chris and Tammy Portell opened the computer store in 2015 after extensively and carefully renovating the building

The Palisade Historical Society features this building on our "Fire and Brimstone" Guided Walking Tour. We do not have a photo of the building showing the front entrance on 5<sup>th</sup> Street when it was the Presbyterian Church in our collection.
