


CHECK OUT OUR PEACH WRAP-PACKING DEMO AT CROSS ORCHARDS – October 20th!

The Palisade Historical Society has been asked to participate in Cross Orchards' Fall Day on the Farm on October 20th! We will show how peaches were packed for shipping 60 years ago!



As Palisade's fresh peach season will have passed by mid-October, experienced packers will make do by individually wrapping peach-shaped squeeze balls in paper, and placing them in alternating rows in wooden boxes from the era. Everyone interested in trying their hands at packing will receive a nickel—which is what most seasonal peach packers were paid to fill the whole box in the 1960s!

Wine Country Inn's Orchard Meeting Room Now Features Historic Palisade Photos



In keeping with an effort to honor Palisade heritage by displaying historic photos, Wine Country Inn has added new pictures highlighting agriculture in the Orchard Meeting Room off the main lobby. That room is reverting to its original name and purpose.

With Bill Floryancic's inspiration, the Inn was decorated with historic photos throughout the public areas, halls, and guest rooms when it opened in 2008. Those photos were loaned by the Museums of Western Colorado's Marie Tipping Archives, Palisade Library Collection. All photos were reproduced and framed at the Inn's expense.

Historic photos of Inn Owner Richard Tally's Shofner, Spencer, and Tally ancestors back in Texas and Tennessee which originally graced the walls of the Orchard Room when it was utilized as a restaurant space, have been moved to the newly constructed Caroline's Restaurant on the Northeast corner of the main reception building.

The new addition prompted the owners to request assistance from the Palisade Historical Society for *(continued)*

early Palisade photos for the vacated room. The Orchard Room features more photos from the Marie Tipping Archives, Palisade Library Collection as well as from Palisade Historical Society collections.

The photos include workers pruning orchards – on ladders and stilts–peach pickers using Palisade-invented picking sacks, and bushel baskets of fruit on tractors in the orchard and being loaded into refrigerated railcars. There is also the Government Highline Canal at the point where the Price and Stub ditches have been diverted since 1917, a Palisade-invented Edwards Grader, and more.

The Inn, at its own expense, publishes a four-color brochure to aid guests in identifying photos on site. Last year, the Historical Society provided descriptive information for the brochure. Richard Tally explains, "We're proud to promote our heritage. Our guests love the connection. He adds "It is important to know your past to build a better future."
