

## 4<sup>th</sup> of JULY PARADE WAS JULY 3<sup>rd</sup>

A popular parade entry in Palisade's July 4<sup>th</sup> Parade for the past five parades is the Historical Society's 1951 Chevrolet Orchard Hoopie. "Dale," is named for a previous owner, Dale Ferguson. Ralph Branch drove and Gary Hines and Kent Brown walked the route through downtown Palisade in what has been record-setting heat in the Grand Valley this year.

The flatbed was piled with historic items often carried by hoopie vehicles in their orchard work, including ladders, baskets, a picking sack, and a pair of stilts.

# CAMEO CASH REGISTER GETS NEW DISPLAY TABLE

One of the intriguing items in our History Museum is the cash register used in the Cameo Mercantile.

Thanks to the artistry of Dave Tredway of Palisade, the Cameo Mercantile cash register now has a beautiful new oak display table to showcase its grandeur. The vintage cash register is one of several items on display at the Palisade History Museum from the Cameo Mercantile store. The store served the miners and residents of Cameo and housed the Cameo Post Office until it closed in 1969.

#### HOW TO CORRECT OCR ERRORS IN THE DIGITAL PALISADE TRIBUNES

If you have looked at digital copies of *The Palisade Tribune* – or other historic newspapers on the Colorado Virtual Library database - you can often *(continued)*  see differences between the scanned image on the right and the Optical-Character Recognition printing on the left side of the screen. The OCR process is critical for researching by name or topic. Correcting those errors – by looking at what was printed – improves the accuracy of the searches. There are 2,650 issues of the Palisade Tribune on the CVL database – every issue we have located from June 6, 1903, to 1950, and later ones in the 1960s.



We continue to fundraise digitize more issues as students, teachers, professors, journalists, and television reporters have used digitized *Palisade Tribune* articles for research and correct information for classes and work.

#### RESTAURANTS IN HISTORIC BUILDINGS CHANGED HANDS IN JUNE

Two Palisade restaurants in downtown historic buildings changed ownership in June. The first was in the back of the Hugus Building (Stop #27 in our historic walking tour brochure) built in 1903 as part of the Palisade Mercantile. Copeka Coffee, owned by Jana and Lee Joramo, and their daughter, Kyra Rossler, opened this Main Street Palisade location in addition to their original Grand Junction business at 1012 North 5th Street.

Jana has a deep connection to Palisade as her grandparents met here and her mother packed peaches for a local fruit grower as a teenager during harvests. The previous eatery, the Purple Cow, closed last fall after only a few months. Mumzel's Coffee Shop was in the space at the back of the Hugus Building before that. *(continued)*

Copeka Coffee in Palisade has a similar menu with great coffee, organic pastries and a variety of food made in-house. It also is displaying historic photos of the Hugus Building and other downtown Palisade historic structures from the Historical Society's collection. You can eat inside or have take-out. Copeka Coffee is open every day from 7:00 a.m. to 2 p.m.

The Palisade Café and Wine Bar (Stop #23 on our walking tour brochure) also changed ownership. The new owners are Jeff Snook and Jody Corey who also own the Spoke and Vine Motel on Highway 6. The restaurant is in the Hugus Additions, built on 3<sup>rd</sup> Street in 1908. The space was a Post Office in 1912 and the first Palisade Café opened there in 1924. It has been home to several Palisade Cafes with more than a dozen different owners.

Four other downtown Palisade restaurants--13° Brix Cider Bistro at 3<sup>rd</sup> and Kluge, 357 Grill (#3), Pêche (#24) and Slice 'O' Life Bakery (#25 and #26) continue to be operated by their original owners! Pressed Coffee and Wine House (#20) is closed with a pending sale.
