

The February history talk at The Ordinary Fellow Winery on Thursday, the 16th will focus on the historic and current efforts to line the Government Highline Canal. Over the years, the methods changed, beginning with work done by the Civilian Conservation Corps in the late 1930s. Tina Bergonzini, General Manager of the Grand Valley Water Users Association, will present photos and information about work currently done to prevent seepage and reduce salinity and selenium loading into the Colorado River.

Last month's talk "A Bison Tale"

Holly "Sonny" Shelton, archaeologist, faunal analysis specialist, and field crew member for Grand River Institute and Dominguez Archaeological Research Group (DARG presented her work with DARG focusing on human/bison Western interaction specific to Colorado. Radiometric testing results show that bison existed here from 45,000 years ago to the late 1800s.

WHAT'S NEW AT THE PALISADE HISTORY MUSEUM

Among our recent acquisitions are two essential coal mining artifacts which were used in the Cameo/Powderhorn mine to monitor the air quality and ensure the safety of miners.

Anonometer measures oxygen

The first artifact on display is an anonometer which miners would carry with them into the mine. It measured the amount of oxygen in the air and alerted



the miner when the oxygen level was below the minimum level. (*Continued*) Page 1



The second new artifact is a flame safety lamp, or "bug lamp" as it was referred to by Palisade area coal miners. It was a complex device could which not be unassembled inside the mine. It was made of brass and contained a flame protected by screens. The miners would hang it where they were working in the mine. If the air quality diminished, the light would change, alerting them to immediately get outside.

DAVE's TRIBUNE RESEARCH

Longtime Historical Society volunteer Dave Cecuga passionately researches *The Palisade Tribune* archives. One of his most recent discoveries is there was an icehouse in a building behind the Purcell building in the early 1900s. In 1921, the icehouse became the location of Hoffman Motors, just east of the Purcell Building. Mr. Purcells ice-house just back of his brick block that is going up at the corner of third and main is about completed. The liquid refreshments stored in it will be surrounded by five car loads of ice, eight feet thick on top and five and a half feet on the sides.

Dave found this article in the June 17, 1905 Palisade Tribune.

MARY RHOADES PASSED AWAY IN NOVEMBER

We were sorry to read that Mary Rhoades passed away in Grand Junction. She contacted us in 2015 and shared insights about Palisade in the 1930s, and especially, her parents' stores in downtown Palisade. She and her husband, Bud who survives her, provided encouragement for our early efforts to preserve and communicate Palisade history.

Mary's parents, Joseph and Clara Smith, came to Palisade in 1920. Joe was a tailor and bought a building on the west side of Main Street where he operated The Palisade Tailor Shop beginning in 1921. He ordered and remade suits as well as provided cleaning and pressing services. It was just north of the empty lot where the Jordan's Inn burned in 1915.

Clara Pinkard Smith was a skilled seamstress and ran the successful Palisade Millinery Store in the same building next to the Tailor Shop from 1922 until 1928. Mary told us she made hats for notable people in Grand Junction, including the Prinsters and the Biggs.

Mary was born in Palisade in September 1931 and attended first grade in Palisade. The family moved to Clifton, so she attended schools there and graduated from Clifton High School which was an adobe building where Clifton elementary is now.

In about 1938, her father moved the building where the Tailor and Millinery Store were located to their 20-acre ranch near the "Big Tree Road" on the highway to Clifton.

Some of Mary's childhood memories were the taffy shop in the Vineland, and getting penny candy from the McGinnis Barber Shop on Main St.
