

THE ORDINARY FELLOW WINERY HISTORY TALK "Colorado River Siphon Celebrates 100 Years" Thursday, May 11th at 6 p.m.

The May history talk at The Ordinary Fellow Winery on Thursday, the 11th will celebrate the 100th birthday of the Colorado River Siphon which is a vital part of getting irrigation water to fruit orchards on Orchard Mesa. *The Palisade Tribune* article below details the siphon's opening in May 1923.

COMPLETE WORK ON SIPHON

Last Saturday the last concrete was run for the large siphon under the Colorado river above Palisade, that is to carry 800 feet of water to Orchard Mesa. The siphon was connected with the 900-foot concrete flume which receives the water after it passes under the river through the siphon. The siphon itself is 700 feet in length and is laid about 5 feet under the bed of the river. At one end is a large concrete tube 12 feet in diameter and about 150 feet deep, which will stand full of water so as to give pressure to throw the water out at the outlet, the tube is reduced to about nine feet in diameter where it goes under the river. The river has been damed up while the work was in progress. The siphon eliminates about 5 miles of flume from the intake of the old canal. A small amount of water was turned into the ditch yesterday and after a few days the full amount needed by the people on Orchard Mesa will probably be flowing thru the new siphon. The siphon will carry 800 feet of water but that amount is not needed at the time and it will only receive 400.



We also celebrated the 100th birthday of the United Fruit Growers' Association (UFGA) which was founded in April 1923. Guests at the April history talk were treated to a slice of delicious peach flavored birthday cake from Slice O Life Bakery.

The UFGA was the major grower-owned marketing organization that marketed and shipped fruit–initially by refrigerated railroad cars. The Ordinary Fellow Winery building was built by the UFGA in 1977 after the wooden platforms burned. Fruit was shipped via refrigerated semi-trucks from the new metal building from 1977 to 2000.

Robert (Bob) Cutter passes away in Glenwood Springs

Bob Cutter, a descendant of the Palisade pioneer Cutter family, passed away April 23 in Glenwood Springs, Colorado at age 83. His grandfather John Cutter, and great-grandfather, William Cutter, operated the Glenwood Nursery in Junction City, Kansas and shipped fruit trees to Palisade in the 1890s and early 1900s. The Cutter family then moved to Palisade. Bob was a lawyer and Linda, his wife of almost 60 years, moved to Glenwood Springs in 1965. The Cutters are Legacy Donors of the Palisade Historical Society and came to the Ribbon Cutting and Dedication of the Palisade History Museum in August 2021.
