#### PALISADE HIGH SCHOOL AUDITORIUM-GYMNASIUM REOPENED OCTOBER 24<sup>TH</sup>

The long-awaited official opening of the renovated Auditorium-Gymnasium was held on Tuesday, October 24<sup>th</sup>. Planned to be built contiguous to the 1926 High School which opened in 1926, it was not financially possible until 1940 when the WPA funded much of the money to construct it.

The Historical Society provided 20 historic photographs and information about the history of it and other school buildings on the property over the years. The original 1926 building and the east wing added in the early 1950s were demolished earlier this year to make room for the new Community Hospital Clinic which opened earlier this year.

#### DAR PLAQUE ON PALISADES NATIONAL BANK BUILDING DEDICATED OCTOBER 28TH

The Mount Garfield Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) worked for more than a year to get an official bronze plaque for the Palisades National Bank building at 3<sup>rd</sup> and Main Street as part of its historic preservation goals.

This historic Palisade building is now in the DAR's popular database of designated sites across the country.

The bronze plaque was dedicated in a ceremony on October 28<sup>th</sup>. Sheryl Fitzgerald, past regent of the Mount Garfield DAR introduced honored guests. DAR member and Palisade Historical Society founding chair Priscilla Walker did much of the research and documentation required for national DAR approval, as her grandfather, George W. Bowman, was president of the Palisades National Bank from 1910 to 1942. Some of her research was from her family's records.

Kimberly Daniels, Colorado State Recording Secretary braved the winter weather warning and brought greetings on behalf of Leslie Brinkley, the State Regent for the Colorado State Society. She was especially glad to have a *(continued)* Page 2 DAR plaque approved for a Western Slope building.

Brian Quarnstrom and Alex Hood, current owners of the bank building, chose not to venture on the icy I-70 corridor to attend the ceremony, but were very supportive of the project. They also became business members of the Palisade Historical Society and have historic photos of downtown Palisade – especially those featuring the bank building – on display in the top floor for residents to also appreciate its history.

Another honored guest at the ceremony was former Palisades National Bank President Mike McEvoy. He knew from the minutes he read of the early bank director meetings that even though the Town's name changed in 1904 to Palisade without an "s," the bank's name did not change in 1905 when it began in the Purcell building on Main Street because it would have cost \$500!

## FALL DAY ON THE FARM AT CROSS ORCHARDS

Cross Orchards annual fundraising event was held October 21st with a record turnout. The Palisade Historical Society had a display in the Barn surrounded by Palisade artifacts including picking sacks, and peach packing equipment.

A popular addition for this year's display were short videos showing how peach trees were pruned by men on stilts, and how peaches were wrap-packed in wooden boxes which were then shipped in refrigerated railroad box cars. The video display is also at the History Museum, which is open four days a week – Tuesdays, Thursdays, Fridays, and Saturdays from 10 to 2.
