THE ORDINARY FELLOW WINERY MONTHLY TALK "The Historic Crissey House" by JoAnn Rasmussen Thursday, Jan. 25th at 6 p.m.

The January history talk at The Ordinary Fellow Winery on Thursday, the 25th will be presented by JoAnn and Kirk Rasmussen, owners of The Historic Crissey House in Palisade. Join us as they share some of their adventures, and what it's like living in and rehabilitating a property on the National Register of Historic Places. Hear what it means to be an amateur archaeologist in your own home, and why they'd do it all again in a heartbeat!

Last month's talk was "Celebrating 80 Years of Legacy on the Colorado Plateau"

For the December history talk, Ashton Peterhans, Interpretive Specialist and Contractor for the U.S. Department of Energy Office of Legacy Management, explained how uranium changed Grand Junction at a critical time in the nation's history.

On March 23, 1943, 2nd Lt. Philip C. Leahy arrived in Grand Junction to procure as much uranium as possible from the Colorado Plateau which comprised 14% of the uranium used in the Manhattan project.

February 22nd history talk - is Curtis Martin - "Bright Beads and Rusted Relics: Innovative Archaeology on a 19th Century Ute Indian Site"

The February history talk on Thursday, the 22nd at 6 p.m. at the Ordinary Fellow Winery, will be presented by Curtis Martin, principal investigator for the Wickiup Project and author of *Ephemeral Bounty*. He will talk about interesting findings at the McMillen Archaeological site near Delta.

The Star truck was made by Durant Motors, which was created in 1922 by Billy Durant, the original founder of General Motors. The Star would have been seen in the 1920's bringing fruits and vegetables from farm to market.

Our volunteers also informally shared the history of the Palisade United Methodist Church and two long-time Methodist Church member families--the Aspinalls and the Avon Taylors. The talks concluded with Rena Mary Taylor's 1942 Christmas poem at the Church program on Saturday, December 2^{nd.}

PIONEER MONUMENT TOP GETS MUCH NEEDED REPAIRS



Local stonemason Charles Harrington repaired the monument top in December.

The Plateau Valley Historical Society received permission to make much-needed repairs to the top of the stone monument at I-70 Exit 47. It was originally located on Highway 65 near the entrance to Plateau Canyon. It was dedicated June 14, 1931, by the Grand Junction Elks Lodge 575 B.P.O.E on what was the "Colorado River Highway." It was moved to its current location in 1965 when I-70 was widened. The stone mason who repaired the monument's top in December, Charles Harrington, grew up in Rifle and remembers seeing the monument in its original location.

The Plateau Valley Historical Preservation Society continues fundraising to get the missing brass plaques replaced and create a new sign with historical information erected nearby to make the monument more visible.
